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## 198th Regiment Seeks to Enlist Delawareans At Camp Upton, L. I.

Any Citizen Wishing To Join State Guard Unit Can At New York Base

"H" APPRECIATES PARTY  
Officers, Enlisted Men Express Thanks For Send-Off Given In Armory

CAMP UPTON, L. I., N. Y., Sept. 26—Still several hundred men short of their maximum authorized strength, the 198th Coast Artillery (Anti-Aircraft) Regiment of Delaware National Guardsmen, starting a year's duty in active service here, is anxious to recruit men from their home state. Word has been sent out that any residents of Delaware desiring to join their home state Regiment can do so by presenting themselves at Camp Upton, here, and meeting the regular enlistment requirements.

Meanwhile the soldiers of the 198th were going through their regular army routine as Camp Upton takes on the shape of a permanent camp with the completion of new barracks and buildings. However the Delaware Anti-Aircraftmen are not expected to stay here after the end of fall. It is expected that they will be transferred to a new base in the vicinity of Savannah, Ga. to train during the winter. Their camp will be set up along the coast where they will have easy access to firing ranges, and where they will spend much of their training at target practice.

With the arrival of the 1st Battalion (Wilmington) over the past week end, all units of the 198th are now in camp here. As the men expressed it "They are finding it interesting, but hard work" the climate is invigorating but cold.



## 691 Registered Here Saturday, Total For "100" Is Now 4,160

## Turnout Below Expected Number. As More Than 1,000 Eligible Voters Must Register

Registration throughout New Castle Hundred was light on last Saturday with only 691 persons being added to the books. However this brings the total number qualified to vote in the general election, Nov. 5, to 4,160. For this Hundred. Previously 3,469 names were recorded here on the three registration days in August and July.

The poor showing here was in keeping with the general trend all over the State. With only one more registration day, Oct. 19th, remaining before election, it is estimated that nearly 1,000 eligible voters have failed to qualify in this Hundred. The State as a whole has registered about three quarters of its expected 140,000 voters.

Wilmington's registration is estimated to be 11,000 behind the 1936 registration figures. The total municipal registration is now 54,000 as 11,000 names were added on Saturday. It was reported by Thomas E. Peeney, secretary of the County Board of Elections that 7,500 names were enrolled in rural New Castle County bringing the total to 31,000.



## Congregation To Mark 120th Anniversary Of Methodist Church Here

## Dr. Walter E. Gunby, District Superintendent Of Peninsula Conference, To Preach At Service Sunday Morning; History Traced

One hundred and seventy-one years of Methodism in New Castle will be recalled here on Sunday when the congregation of the local Methodist Church observes their 120th anniversary. Dr. Walter E. Gunby, Superintendent of the Wilmington District of the Peninsula Conference, will preach at the morning service here. His topic will be "Making Life To Be A Song."

## Anniversary Speaker

The Rev. John E. French, pastor of the Church, will be in charge of the evening services. Arthur Kern will have charge of the devotional services.

Although the present congregation had its beginning here in 1820, Methodism in New Castle goes back to 1769 and the day of Capt. Webb. According to Lednum, in "The Rise of Methodism," this appealing figure of those days who preached in his Captain's uniform, with his sword laid across the pulpit, and always with the patch over one eye, "was the first Methodist preacher that preached in Wilmington, New Castle, and other places in that region and that, too, was early as 1769."

## Records From 1820

Records of the congregation since 1820 show the names of all pastors who have served the church since that time, although the names of all the Methodist preachers who have preached here are not known. There is some question as to whether the Rev. John E. French is the 65th or 66th pastor of the church. The Rev. George R. Bristol served the congregation twice, from 1877-78, and in 1881. This is the only instance in the history of the church in which a pastor has served more than once, although the Rev. C. Nadal Jones was the pastor here for five years, being succeeded next May by Mr. French.

Mr. Robert Furnes, who received Capt. Webb and other Methodist preachers later on, was the keeper of a tavern, but, as Asbury states, "a good man." The first Methodist sermon was, no doubt, preached in his tavern. He lost custom by his kindness to these wandering preachers but very largely helped to give Methodism its foothold in New Castle.

## Asbury Preached In Tavern

Asbury notes in his Journal a number of visits—in April, 1772; Dec. 15th of the same year; and May 14, 1775. He says of this first visit, "I
